

Advice For About to be Beekeepers

Some General Advice

- 1. "Saving the Bees" doesn't mean keeping Honey bees.
- 2. Find someone who currently keeps bees and offer to help them (trading learning for labor)
- 3. They may seem like bees you keep in a box, but they are animals you need to care for.
- 4. Join your local bee club and if they offer a beginner bee school, enroll. Keep bees for a few years and you'll be ready for an Intermediate school.
- 5. Start in the spring with at **least** two colonies.
- 6. Plan not to **have bees** but to **keep bees**.
- 7. Expect no honey in your first year; be excited if you get some!
- 8. Know that keeping bees as a hobby is expensive.
- 9. Keeping **healthy** bees may seem like a huge challenge. For starters, concentrate on what normal and healthy looks like.
- 10. Once you keep Honey bees, you'll be keeping Varroa mites as well.
- 11. Know that other beekeepers want you to succeed.

- 12. Build yourself a support network. Get a mentor if you can.
- 13. Read books, magazines; watch videos; learn about bees! Use your brain; If a video proclaims, "watch me install my first package," run!
- 14. Attend every **open hive** and club meeting you can.
- 15. Stings happen. For most, it is unpleasant but not terrible. (bee stings may be healthy!)
- 16. **Learn** about bees!
- 17. Recognize that as a beekeeper, you are doing agriculture. Plans can go out the window at a moment's notice, and you need to work with what you have.
- 18. Don't be afraid to **ask** questions, but don't expect all the answers always to agree. There are lots of equally valid approaches.
- 19. Knowing about bees is **cool!** You'll be sharing knowledge in no time. What's more, you'll soon be the neighborhood expert on stinging insects!
- 20. Welcome to beekeeping; welcome to agriculture. You got this!
